

LATE TERM ABORTION... BAY AREA PROTEST AT BERKELEY HOSPITAL



Late term abortion is a procedure which terminates the life of the pre-born child who is beyond the third month gestational life. A viable life is one which may be able to live outside the womb.

The U.S. Supreme Court, in one of its abortion pronouncements, declared that it was desirable for the state to support life in preference to abortion. It further declared that no hospital, privately or publicly funded, was required to make its surgery accessible to the abortionist.

The California legislature (in one of its more lucid moments) passed health and safety code Rule No. 25955 - REFUSAL TO PARTICIPATE IN ABORTION. In general it states that no employer or other person shall require a physician, a registered nurse, a licensed vocational nurse, or any other person employed, or with staff privileges at a hospital, facility or clinic to directly participate in the induction or performance of an abortion.

Herrick Hospital in Berkeley, opened its doors to two abortionists who were bringing in women late into their third trimester of pregnancy. The surgery nurses began to protest their involvement in this nasty but legal business. At the same time, some Berkeley residents formed an organization, Concerned Citizens for the Rights of the Unborn and began to picket Herrick Hospital during the week of July 19th, when the California hospital accreditation team was due.

In February, a mysterious caller contacted the CRLC office to inform us of "strange goings on" at surgery in Herrick. During May a nurse from Herrick informed a CRLC member of unusual circumstances surrounding the issues of induced abortion, stage of pregnancy, patient age and residency, and degree of surgical participation by nurses. Late term abortions, the caller said, are especially revolting to watch and very offensive to the ethics of many of the nurses and doctors. This informant suggested that to effect a change in the situation, community protest was needed.

The Concerned Citizens began their picket. They received both praise and abuse for their efforts, praise from many within the hospital and community, and abuse in the form of rotten eggs, moldy chicken soup and epithets hurled at them.

Concerned citizens have written to the Herrick Community Hospital Advisory Trustees, Mr. Cutter of Cutter Laboratories, Chairman of the Board. However, this Board has chosen to deny the values of the community and allow the Drs. Carl Watson and Paul Wright to continue their business as usual. The hospital has decided to hire a nurse for a 16 hour work week to assist the doctors in performing elective abortions. So far no one has applied.

Later, every surgery nurse and 18 doctors signed a petition directed to the administrative staff refusing to participate in abortion unless it was a therapeutic or emergency situation. This nurse indicated extreme pressure from the administrative staff as well as the abortionists to participate or be threatened with loss of position or job.

Due to the TV and newspaper coverage of this protest, the Drs. Watson and Wright have taken their business to Alta Bates Hospital where they are about to be met with the same resistance.

A reporter from the San Francisco Examiner contacted the CRLC office and interviewed the President, Camille Giglio. He also spoke with the protesters. His special report on this protest was delayed because his Editor refused to allow the article to be published unless he could obtain an interview with a nurse or doctor inside the hospital directly involved with the protest. So far the nurses have maintained public silence claiming that the hospital has threatened reprisals for any "leaks" of hospital business. Nor have any doctors been available for public comment. More Berkeley community residents are coming to the aid of the nurses and pickets and are gathering signatures to present to the hospital protesting the use of their community hospital facility as an abortion center for women from as far away as San Diego and other Southern California communities as well as occasional out-of-state residents.

LIFE SENTENCES...

In Pasadena low income women who have babies are required to attend family planning classes at the local Planned Parenthood affiliate before they may receive post-partum medical services under the Medi-Cal program. . . Attorneys for the Catholic League for Religious and Civil Rights will handle the appeal of the "Dominican Eight" who were sentenced on May 7th for practicing their ministry of "sidewalk counseling" at the Planned Parenthood Clinic in Walnut Creek. . . In a precedent-setting case, a Connecticut federal judge ruled that a 5 1/2 month old unborn child has a right to sue the Hartford Police Department and two officers who allegedly were involved in the beating of the mother in July, 1981. At the time of the ruling, the child was nine months old. . . In August, the Planned Parenthood office in San Francisco was broken into and their suction abortion machine stolen. What a surprise that must have been to Dr. Geraldine Oliva who proclaimed on television recently that P.P. only provides abortion services to disadvantaged people in outlying communities.

FROM Washington



ALL EYES ON THE SENATE

The long-awaited Senate showdown on abortion was delayed again on August 16 by a pro-abortion filibuster lead by GOP Sen. Robert Packwood and aided by Sen. Lowell Weicker. The filibuster was directed against Sen. Jesse Helms' revised Super Bill (see below) which he had just introduced as amendments to the debt ceiling bill which the House and Senate must pass before Oct. 1.

Week long attempts to break the filibuster failed and as the session ended, GOP Majority Leader Howard Baker filed a cloture petition to end its filibuster soon after members returned to Washington after Labor Day. Although 18 senators signed promptly, 60 signatures are needed for cloture end or limitation of debate.

In a vote for cloture on Sept. 9, Sen. Helms fell 19 votes short of the necessary 60 on a 41 to 47 vote. Additional attempts to close the filibuster were scheduled for the week of Sept. 12 as the NEWS goes to press. Also, on the Senate agenda for that same week was a vote on the Hatch Constitutional Amendment. It was not expected to attract the 2/3's vote needed to pass.

REVISED SUPER BILL. "Helms offered his amendments in such a way as to prevent weakening of the abortion provision. First, he introduced a first degree amendment designed to permit voluntary prayer in public schools. Then he offered a second degree amendment, dealing with abortion. Since second degree amendments cannot be altered, attempts to dilute the Helms bill—for example, by adding "rape/incest" or "genetic defects" exceptions to the funding restrictions -- will not be in order.

Some press accounts have described the new Helms bill as "weakened" or "watered down". But nothing could be further from the truth. The bill still contains the findings that human life begins at conception and that the unborn are persons under the law. The purpose of the Human Life Bill always has been to obtain Supreme Court reconsideration of Roe v. Wade in light of Congressional findings. It was not intended to eradicate judicial review, but to invite judicial review. The means initially chosen was an exercise of Congressional power to expand the scope of the 14th Amendment through legislation. This technique proved controversial and threatened to sidetrack the Senate debate away from abortion and onto peripheral matters.

For this reason, Sen. Helms revised his legislation. Instead of exercising 14th Amendment powers, the new bill finds that the Supreme Court erred in Roe v. Wade when it: 1) failed to recognize the humanity of the unborn child; 2) held that states do not have a compelling interest in protecting life before birth; and 3) excluded the unborn from the

'safeguards afforded by the equal protection and due process provisions of the Constitution. The bill thus achieves the same end as earlier Human Life Bill proposals, but does not raise thorny constitutional issues." Christian Action Council

JUSTICE DEPARTMENT INTERVENES

Late in July President Reagan told the Supreme Court that states and communities should have greater flexibility to make legal abortions more difficult to obtain.

In an unusual friend-of-the-court brief, Justice Department lawyers said courts should give "heavy deference" to state and local regulation of abortion.

The brief marks the first time since the 1973 Supreme Court abortion decisions that the Justice Department has presented its views in an abortion case to which the federal government is not a party and no federal law is involved.

Next year, the Supreme Court is expected to decide the constitutionality of various abortion regulations contained in Akron, Ohio ordinances and state laws in Missouri and Virginia. Many of the regulatory provisions were struck down as unconstitutional by lower courts.

The Justice Department brief, filed in the Missouri and Ohio cases, urged the court to reject those portions of the rulings and send the cases back for more study.

PROTECTION FOR HANDICAPPED INFANTS

U.S. Congressman John Erlenborn (R-Ill) has introduced a bill to expand and strengthen federal protection of handicapped infants. His "Handicapped Infants Protection Act" (HR 6492) states that hospitals which receive federal aid must provide equal treatment to handicapped and non-handicapped infants. Most hospitals receive some form of federal aid. (See related article "Nation's Hospitals Must Protect Newborn" by Doug Scott in this issue).

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CRLC arranged to have Albin Rhomberg speak on an Alaskan radio station (via phone). His subject was the "American Holocaust."

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ABOUT FACE AT UNIVERSITY OF SAN FRANCISCO: This coming school year, not only are the President and Vice-President of the Student Government pro-life (Herman Petzold and Bill Goyette respectively); but, likewise for the Editor Brian Pecha and Managing Editor, Jim Sweeney, of the campus newspaper "The Foghorn".

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CRLC members appeared on TV, Channel 7's "Say What You Think" program in June with a rerun in August. BAD NEWS



ALSO AT UNIVERSITY OF SAN FRANCISCO: Esteemed philanthropist, Mrs. Ralph K. Davies recently bestowed \$1,000,000 on USF. Two thirds of the endowment will be used to initiate and maintain the Davies Forum under the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences. The goal of the program is to restore ethical ideals to American society. The first Davies Fellow, the Rev. Robert F. Drinan, S.J., is scheduled for Sept. 28, 1982. Father Drinan is well known for his outspoken opinion in favor of abortion.

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In late July, the San Francisco Board of Supervisors voted 9-2 in favor of a resolution which requests U.S. Senators from California to oppose all pending federal legislation regulating abortion.

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The Catholic Charities office of the Oakland Catholic Diocese was recently the site of a workshop on STERILIZATION OF THE HANDICAPPED.

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The state office of Family Planning is at it again! They are offering anywhere from \$6,000 to \$205,000 for public and private agencies to find better ways to encourage the public to accept sterilization and abortion programs for "educationally disadvantaged, low-income groups, racial minority and monolingual non-english speaking people." Program proposals to be submitted by November 23, 1982, with contract awards announced in late February 1983.

At a recent national convention of the League of Women Voters the following resolution was introduced and passed 754-472:

Local leagues are asked to concur with the following statement which reflects the conclusions of the 1982 League of Women Voters of New Jersey and the 1972 League of Women Voters of Massachusetts consensus positions concerning public policy on reproductive matters.

The League of Women Voters of the United States believe that public policy in a pluralistic society must affirm the constitutional right of privacy of the individual to make reproductive choices.

It is important to note the public policy position of the New Jersey delegation that was attached to this resolution. It is as follows:

The League of New Jersey strongly rejects any public policy based on the premise that from the moment of conception a fetus should be defined as a person and guaranteed the right to Life.

The complete statement also addresses informed consent and personal privacy.

Since this resolution carried at the national convention, it is now required that each local league put this motion for concurrence on their agenda for consideration by this November. Each league must vote to concur or not to concur with this statement.

There are several things that we can do to influence this outcome:

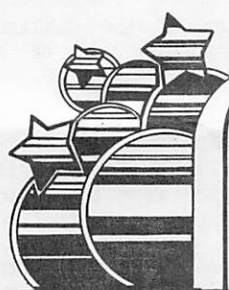
First Identify the pro-life league members in your community and ask them to vote against concurrence.

Second You (whether you are a man or a woman) can join your local League of Women Voters. Any citizens over the age of 18 have the right to join and would also have the right to vote on this issue as well as many others.

Third Be a resource to your local League. As a member you have an excellent opportunity to help in the education process.

The League of Women Voters is a large and powerful group and if this position is adopted at the national level, we can expect hundreds of thousands of citizens lobbying against the Human Life Amendment and state pro-life legislation. They will be able to do this in the name of the league and this could have a devastating effect on our progress in defense of human life.

BURIAL OF FETUSES

"Right to Life groups are involved in a court fight to determine whether they can provide a burial service for 17,000 human fetuses that were found stored near Los Angeles. The feminist Women's Health Center in Hollywood has complained that any release of the fetuses for burial services would violate the separation of church and state. A superior court judge has temporarily blocked such a service. Meanwhile, the Los Angeles District Attorney's Office is attempting to determine whether or not any of the unborn babies was over 20 weeks old. A deputy district attorney said all abortions are illegal except those performed under the California Therapeutic Abortion Act, which requires that the fetus be under 20 weeks and viable -- except where there is danger to the life and health of the mother." 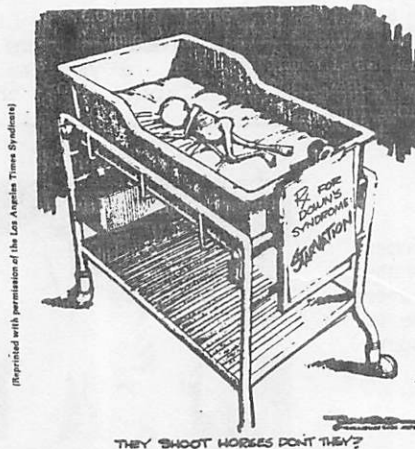

NATION'S HOSPITALS MUST PROTECT NEWBORN BABIES

Following the starvation of one newborn infant in Bloomington, Indiana and charges by American Life Lobby that medical treatment was being denied another in Robinson, Illinois, America's 6,800 hospitals have been ordered by Department of Health and Human Services Director Richard Schweiker to protect all newborn infants equally.

Hospitals were warned federal funds can be terminated if they deny food or medical help to babies born with severe physical defects.

A two-page telegram by Secretary Schweiker emphasized federal law prohibits denial of care to handicapped children "solely because of their handicaps."

Department action came after Judie Brown, President of American Life Lobby, telegraphed the secretary requesting "immediate investigation" of charges that medical care was being withheld from another "Bloomington Baby" afflicted with spina bifida, at Crawford Memorial Hospital, Robinson, Illinois.

The first Bloomington Baby, suffering from Down's Syndrome, was intentionally starved to death at Bloomington Hospital in Indiana after parents denied him surgery -- considered feasible and from minor to serious -- to correct the defect.

The Bloomington death resulted in a directive from President Reagan that hospitals should not discriminate against handicapped.

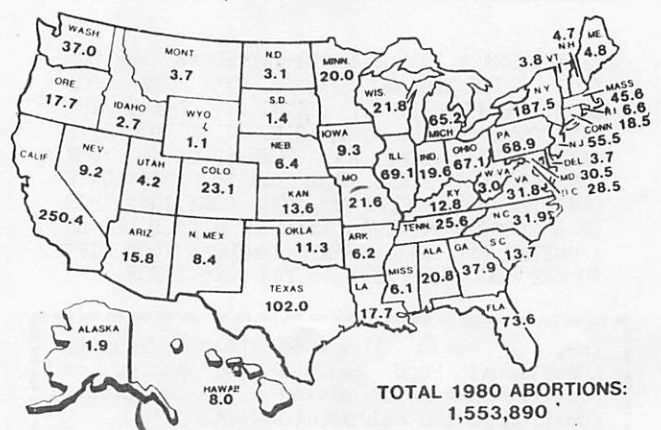
Syndicated columnist/commentator George F. Will, whose active 10 year old son has Down's Syndrome, said his son today "suffers from nothing, except anxiety about the Orioles' lousy start."

Will, commenting about the Bloomington death, wrote "the parents chose to starve their baby to death."

"Their lawyers concocted an Orwellian euphemism for this refusal of potential life-saving treatment, "treatment to do nothing." It is an old story: language must be mutilated when a perfumed rationalization of an act is incompatible with a straightforward description of the act."

Paul Conrad, Pulitzer Prize-winning editorial cartoonist for The Los Angeles Times, illustrated the Bloomington death by an infant corpse in a hospital crib labeled: "RX for Down's Syndrome -- Starvation." Conrad's caption asked, "They shoot horses, don't they?"

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STATE OFFICE REPORT

Immediately following the June 8th primary, newsletter editor Del McLaughlin visited the Washington, D.C. offices of 22 California Congressmen. Most of these legislators were pro-life and felt the movement must regain its unity and focus on its common goal -- the protection of all unborn life -- in order to pass desirable pro-life legislation.
